1. Call to Order and Roll Call

The Chair called the meeting to order at 3:00 p.m.

2. Approval of Agenda

3. Approval of Minutes from October 11, 2022 Meeting

Nicole needs to set up time for two commissioners to go to another commission meeting. **In progress. Commissioners need to sign up for dates.**

5. Presentation About Cultural Conversations

Library Director Josephine Camarillo and Maureen Rust with CWU Libraries presented on Cultural Conversations, an event that explores different cultures. They requested one member of the DEI Commission serve on the planning committee. Commissioner Mandujano volunteered to be on the planning committee as a representative of the DEI Commission.

6. Subcommittee Reports

Commissioners Amos, Colazo, and Mandujano met to discuss the listening tours. They are proposing two listening tours with Hispanic (Latine, Latinx) populations, and are considering January for dates. Background/Summary:

David Schwann with the CWU EthicsLab spoke with Kim Holland about a [Human Library](#) event they're planning for Feb 2023. They are based out of Denmark and have partnered with groups in 80 countries to host public discussion events. The concept is that local volunteers serve as human 'books' that interested members of the community can 'check out' for a 30 min conversation. The volunteers typically represent groups that are subject to stigma and prejudice. The slogan of the organization is 'unjudge someone' and the events seem to be pretty impactful.

David started a conversation with Kim Holland and Maureen Rust (CWU Libraries) in the summer about this group and submitted an application. After a brief interview (of sorts), they have approved the application and right now he is just processing the licensing fee through his department before he can access their marketing and recruiting materials. At that stage, he was planning to reach out to interested parties and groups in community/campus to work to recruit volunteers for the 'library.'

David's request:

1. The organization works with prejudice and stigma. So, before they will authorize the final event, they ask that we try to recruit a wide enough diversity of volunteers/books. Specifically, we should aim to recruit as many of the following 'pillars of prejudice' as possible: *Addiction, Disabilities, Ethnicity, Family, Gender and Sex, Health,*

Ideology, Lifestyle, Mental Health, Neurodiversity, Occupation, Religion, Sexuality, Social Status, Victim/Survivor. Given the work that the DEI commission has done, I would appreciate feedback on specific stigmas or forms of prejudice that Ellensburg might benefit from learning more about.

2. We have a bit of time to recruit (event is currently scheduled for Feb 10/11th) though the holidays are going to be a quiet time for a lot of folks. I would love as much help getting the recruiting materials into the hands of potential volunteers/'books' as possible. Those volunteers will apply through the HL and receive some basic training before the event.
3. In terms of the event itself, the only thing I didn't have a budget for (that exists at some events) are Human Library branded t-shirts for the 'books' (volunteers). I think besides that I had just planned to have coffee/tea/water on tap for the duration of the event which I already have from my Good Life discussions.

Belonging In The Burg was held on Saturday, November 12, 2022 from 3-5 p.m. at the Hal Holmes Community Center. Approximately 70 people attended the event including a dozen facilitators and English to Spanish translators. The event was hosted by the City's Diversity, Equity & Inclusion Commission, Ellensburg School District, Central Washington University, and Dispute Resolution Center of Yakima and Kittitas Counties.

Belonging In The Burg



The goal for the event was to connect a diverse group of residents for a meaningful conversation about belonging.

Participants were asked to answer four questions in small group settings:

“What do I gain when I feel as if I belong?”

“I feel like I belong in Ellensburg when... / I feel like I don't belong in Ellensburg when...”

“What do I have to give up when I belong?”

“Do you have to contribute to belong?”

Common Themes We Heard:

- Be open-minded.
- Be willing to give up the idea that what I think or feel won't change.
- Belonging is an essential experience.
- Everyone has to show up in their own way.
- Listening is important.
- People don't feel like they belong until they are comfortable contributing.
- People need to feel welcome.
- Acceptance, safety, trust, respect, and peace.
- Everyone is important.
- There are different ways to contribute.
- Belonging can look and feel different based on context and what you can give. People want to feel safe, valued, and accepted.
- It's hard to feel like you belong if you are judged or discriminated against.

We received 43 feedback forms and 93% of respondents indicated they would like to participate in a similar event in the future. The other 7% indicated maybe.
